

WHAT'S NEW IN PARKLAND COUNTY

Wireless Internet Rebate Program

In response to ongoing demand for wireless internet services, the County is subsidizing equipment and installation fees to remove barriers to quality internet service for qualified residents. Effective December 2, 2024, residents may submit an application to receive a rebate of up to \$1,000 for the hardware and installation costs for a new wireless internet connection.

To be eligible for the rebate, residents must supply proof of a series of CIRA speed tests demonstrating speeds consistently below 50 mbps download/10mbps upload or declare an inability to establish a wired connection.

Funding is currently available for approximately 100 applicants and the program will conclude on or before February 28, 2025 — after which the program will be reviewed. The project team will continually monitor the trial program noting administrative demand, technical issues and opportunities for improvement.

Traffic lights coming soon at two Acheson intersections on Highway 16A

As you travel along Highway 16A in Parkland County, you'll notice some changes to traffic flow in the Acheson area. Funded through Prairies Economic Development Canada, the County has been working on improvements to the intersections at Spruce Valley Road and at Bevington/ Pinchbeck Road. These intersections, once fully completed, will include traffic lights, streetlights, additional turning lanes, acceleration lanes and deceleration lanes along with new road connections north and south of Highway 16A. The improved intersections will also be coupled with speed limit reductions from 100km/h down to 80 km/h along the surrounding stretches of highway.

The improvements will encourage new investment opportunities by opening access to approximately 2,600 acres of developable land in Acheson. The changes are also in alignment with the transitions being introduced at the easterly edges of Spruce Grove and the westerly edges of the City of Edmonton to provide efficient movements while balancing growth pressures within the region.

Most of the work is expected to be complete with both intersections operating by mid-December.

COST RECOVERY FOR EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Starting **January 1, 2025**, Parkland County Fire Services may issue invoices to recover costs from certain types of Emergency Response including:

- Motor Vehicle Collisions and Vehicle Fires on Parkland County roads
- Structure Fires
 Outdoor Fires
- Public Assist
- False Alarms

Large complex fires and preventable responses increase our costs to operate.

For most scenarios, the costs will be recouped from insurance policies that already cover these incidents. That means we can fund the response without having to pass the costs on to all residents through higher tax rates.

This is a cost recovery system, meaning the County doesn't profit from emergency responses and similar policies are in place in municipalities across Alberta.

Does your insurance policy cover fire department response costs? It's important to check your policy to see if you have appropriate coverage.

Over the past year, Parkland County has been working with the Edmonton Humane Society (EHS) to help alleviate the problem of increasing feral cat colonies within the County.

With our support, the EHS Trap Neuter Return (TNR) team recently spent time targeting seven feral cat territories in Parkland County, leading to the spay and neuter of 138 cats and kittens. This initiative helps curb the influx of unwanted cats and prevents the spread of feline diseases in our communities. After such success, Parkland County plans to continue our partnership with EHS and explore more TNR opportunities in 2025 to better support our residents and their furry friends.

SNOW REMOVAL IN PARKLAND COUNTY



PROVINCIAL HIGHWAYS

The Province is responsible for clearing all provincial highways. Parkland County takes care of range roads, township roads and subdivision roads. Please contact Alberta Transportation with concerns on Provincial Highways or view 511.alberta.ca for updated highway conditions.

We can expect to see various snowfall and weather events during the winter season. Parkland County works hard to address road conditions to ensure the overall safety of the road network.

How does the County prioritize snow and ice control?

There is over 2000 km of roadways that require clearing. It is important to have a plan to ensure that plowing is efficient and fair. Parkland County utilizes nine plow trucks and ten graders for snow removal in the County, including subdivisions and hamlets.

The County puts a high importance on getting out to clear the roads for our residents. The County prioritizes roadways as per our Snow and Ice Control Policy. After a major weather event, the County uses the following order for snow removal:

- 1. Arterial roads (highly used roads)
- 2. Collector roads (roadways connecting arterial and subdivision roads)
- 3. Local, subdivision and hamlet roads
- 4. Parking lots and rear lanes (Parkland County facilities and Community Halls)



How long does snow removal take?

Under normal operations, the County will provide snow and ice control to Priority 1 and 2 roads within 36 hours after the end of a major weather event. All other areas will receive snow and ice control within 72 hours after the end of the weather event.

What can I do to help?

- Move cars off the street during snow clearing operations.
- Clear your sidewalk.
- Avoid pushing snow on or across County roadways. This creates a safety hazard and contravenes municipal bylaws.
- When clearing your approach, clear the snow to the left of your driveway to minimize residual snow that can be pushed through your driveway. (see graphic on next page)

SNOW REMOVAL SUBSIDY PROGRAM

Our Snow Removal Subsidy Program provides funding support to residents with disabilities for snow removal from their private driveways. To qualify, you must provide a doctor's note stating that you and adult members of your household are physically unable to remove snow from your driveway. Up to \$500 per winter season is available per household.





PEACE OFFICER PROFILE

Brian Blatz is celebrating 5 years as a **Peace Officer with Parkland County's Enforcement Services team. We** caught up with him recently to find out what the job is really like.

WHAT INTERESTED YOU ABOUT **BECOMING A PEACE OFFICER?**

Being a Peace Officer is great because I have always enjoyed chatting with people and being able to learn what makes them "tick". I'm also a person who will stand up and say something when no one else will — so combining those two traits really suits the role.

WHAT ARE SOME COMMON **MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT PEACE OFFICERS?**

People think all we do is write tickets... well, we do, but that's not our only role! People think we are mean and want to enforce the laws to the fullest when actually, we are very approachable and willing to chat. I would much rather have a conversation on how to fix an issue than be heavy-handed and issue tickets.

WHAT ARE SOME THINGS YOU **WISH PEOPLE KNEW ABOUT PEACE OFFICERS?**

We look to try and fix the problem, not just band-aid it. I do want people to know that, now more than ever, we are extremely busy and most of us are running 30 or more case files. My message to them is 'we will address your problem, but we are just asking for some time.'

WHAT DO YOU LIKE **BEST ABOUT THE JOB?**

The best thing about being a Peace Officer is being able to go into schools and interacting with the kids. Whether I am reading to the younger grades or presenting about safety issues in high school, the kids make it the best part of the day. They are engaged and always come up with the craziest questions that make me laugh, no matter how prepared

It also sounds cliche but having the ability to help people on some of their worst days makes it all worthwhile.

EVANSBURG RCMP UPDATE The RCMP aids Albertans at the federal, provincial and

municipal level by working to:

Due to its vast size, Parkland County receives policing from the RCMP and is served by three detachments — Drayton Valley, Evansburg, and Parkland County.

Evansburg RCMP has continued this year to focus on rural crime and enhancing patrols in smaller communities, along with targeting prolific offenders, drug awareness and educating youth. The public were asked to watch after their neighbours and call in anything they deemed suspicious.

There has been a large increase in calls for suspicious persons and vehicles, and with this help from the public, the RCMP have been able to locate, arrest, charge and remove those individuals looking to target and cause harm within the community.

We ask that all Parkland County residents continue to remain vigilant and work with your neighbours. Do not to hesitate to call the police if you see anything suspicious.

MUNICIPAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN PROJECT

The Municipal Development Plan (MDP) is a high-level plan that establishes a vision for the County's growth over the next 30 years. It sets future direction by identifying where different types of growth and development will occur, including residential, employment, recreation, and community service development. In addition to future land use, the MDP sets out policies to guide infrastructure, transportation, and environmental protection.

LAND USE BYLAW REDESIGN PROJECT

As part of a regular and ongoing process, Parkland County is updating the County's Land Use Bylaw (LUB) in an effort to streamline regulations and create clear and transparent decision-making processes for development in the County.

Project Updates and Next Steps

The LUB Redesign Project consists of three phases.

PHASE 1 — FOUNDATIONAL RESEARCH [COMPLETED]



PHASE 2: DRAFT LAND USE BYLAW AND ENGAGE **[WE ARE HERE]**

The project team has completed the Draft LUB and engagement opportunities are currently underway. Check out the project website for opportunities to provide your feedback.

PHASE 3: FINAL LAND USE BYLAW AND APPROVALS [Q1 2025]

The final phase of the project will include showcasing the final proposed LUB and providing an opportunity for the community to submit feedback prior to final approval. The Municipal Government Act (MGA) requires the adoption of the LUB through a formal process. This process will involve three readings at Parkland County Centre and one Public Hearing.
