

WHAT'S NEW IN PARKLAND COUNTY

Range Road 70 Wildfire

On April 29, a wildfire began west of Range Road 70 near Entwistle and forced the evacuation of hundreds of residents. Dry, hot conditions mixed with heavy winds caused this fire to spread further, eventually jumping the Pembina River and crossing into Yellowhead County and growing to over 7,500 Hectares. The fire burned deep into underground peat, creating hundreds of hotspots and ash pits requiring a focused effort and lots of hard work from our crews to combat the blaze.

Throughout this emergency, Parkland County was amazed at the outpouring of support from residents and other agencies. We received hundreds of offers from the community looking to chip in through offers of equipment, labour, food, and in many other ways.

"We are grateful for all the residents and businesses who were willing to help us out. Our fire crews were working long, hard days in intense heat, and having the support from our community and neighbours really meant a lot," said Fire Chief Brian Cornforth. "It was a great reminder of how we all need to work together in these types of emergencies."

Thank you to all the first responders who have worked tirelessly on this wildfire in order to keep our community safe.

"Parkland County's Fire Services is filled with dedicated staff who continue to go above and beyond with their service. We are very fortunate to have them in our corner, always working hard to protect the place we all call home," said Laura Swain, Chief Administrative Officer.

Over the past three summers, Parkland County piloted the use of BAAH'D Plant Management and Reclamation in our weed control. The program uses trained goats and a targeted grazing method to control weeds in selected areas. The County's agricultural team utilized these goats around Sauer Lake to help manage the tansy weed.

Instead of having staff spray an entire area with chemicals, goats are trained to eat the noxious weeds. The goats graze the flower heads of the tansy before it goes to seed, preventing the spread. They also help cut back grass to increase visibility and access for weed applicators to spot spray any remaining tansy.

Who doesn't love having a friendly goat do some of your work?

BENEFITS OF THE GOATS:

- Goats can access areas that humans can't, such as tight spaces between trees.
- Tansy seeds become inactivated in a goat's stomach, preventing seeds in feces from causing new growth.
- They minimize the need for the use of chemical weed control methods.
- Increases carbon sequestration into the soil while building up organic matter and nutrients of the soil. In the longterm, this helps reduce carbon footprint and weed infestations.

Introducing the Sundance Boat Launch and Recreation Area



Thank you to everyone who shared their input on what to name the Wabamun south side boat launch! After presenting a list of the suggestions to Council, a decision was made to call it the Sundance Boat Launch and Recreation Area.

We look forward to opening the boat launch and park area to the public, but first it requires additional work —

including some necessary dredging to ensure safe passage of vessels. This work will begin after July 1 and is expected to be complete mid-July. Once work is finished, an opening date will be announced. Stay tuned!

Construction Notice

Mink Lake Road (Township Road 524) between Highway 770 and Range Road 25 will be undergoing a full reconstruction over the summer and fall months. This includes the Star Lake access at Range Road 25 and Township Road 524; this Star Lake access point will be closed intermittently throughout the construction process. Notices will be displayed prior. Motorists that are not local traffic are encouraged to take alternative routes and/or expect delays. For those enjoying the lake life:

The Government of Alberta governs water bodies and shores within the province. This includes the placement of seasonal boat docks and mooring structures. Waterfront and Semi-waterfront landowners are not required to get approval from the province as long as their docks and moorings comply with the province's standards. Backlot landowners (separated from the water's

edge by more than one property or road) are required to obtain written authorization from the waterfront landowner and a Temporary Field Authorization (TFA) for Seasonal Docks and Moorings from Alberta Environment and Parks. Wetlands are highly productive ecosystems that are essential for protecting water quality, providing habitat for wildlife, and reducing the impacts of flood and drought by providing increased water storage. Parkland County has lost approximately 56% of our previous wetland area since the 1950s. We now have a unique opportunity

to re-establish wetlands in our area through the provincial Wetland Replacement Program. Funds that have been collected to compensate for wetland loss can now be accessed and used for wetland construction and restoration projects. 
Weed Control Program

Not all plants are good! There are specific weeds you cannot leave unmanaged on your property. These weeds, designated as "prohibited noxious and noxious" under the Alberta Weed Control Act. can spread rapidly and cause serious problems. Property owners are responsible for controlling these plants on their property.

As shown in the image below, we have selected areas of the County where we will focus our resources

for 2023 weed inspections and control. We will begin with controlling weeds on County lands and then begin assessing private properties. Properties with noxious and prohibited noxious weeds will be inspected and recommendations for control will be given.

Please note: A weed notice can be issued in extreme cases where no efforts are made to prevent the spread of noxious weeds or destroy prohibited noxious weeds.



Vegetation Control Program

Parkland County's Agricultural Services Department will be using a combination of methods to control noxious and prohibited noxious weeds on County lands as designated under the Alberta Weed Control Act. These methods include:

- · Herbicide application
- Mowing
- Biological control agents
- Manual removal

Herbicides used this upcoming season may include:

Clearview PCP #29752 Truvist PCP# 30920 Lontrel XC PCP #32795 Milestone PCP #28517 Navius PCP #30922

Escort PCP #23005

Biological control agents are used to control Yellow Toadflax, Leafy Spurge and Canada Thistle at sensitive sites throughout the County.

For your safety and worker safety, please refrain from approaching staff or disturbing biological control sites while work is in progress.

Roadside Mowing

Roadside mowing occurs over the summer and is completed with safety and weed control as the top priorities. Due to the large land base of the County and the size of our mower fleet, some roads may not be mowed until later in the season. Each year, mowers are sent to different sections of the County and spread out on a rotational basis. Collector roads are given priority and are mowed more than once per season for safety considerations on high traffic roads.

We are not able to determine exactly when mowers will arrive in a specific area. Please ensure that all road signs without a permit are removed. Parkland County will remove and dispose of any unpermitted signs left within the road allowance.

Travel around the region

On-demand local transit services within Stony Plain and Spruce Grove operates from 5 am – 7 pm Monday through Friday. Acheson and Parkland Village operates from 5 am - 9 am and 2:15 pm - 6:15 pm.

Parkland County was successful in receiving the Government of Alberta New Horizons Grant. With this grant we will be piloting a Senior's Transportation Program. Stay tuned, details will be coming to our website at www.parklandcounty.com/Seniors



Improving rural internet for residents and businesses in Parkland County continues to be a priority. We are waiting on announcements from Universal Broadband Fund (UBF) to ensure County funds are utilized in the most responsible and effective way with the greatest impact for our communities. The UBF is a federal program that supports broadband infrastructure projects bringing high-speed Internet to rural and remote households. These UBF announcements have been delayed, which in turn affects our timelines. Pending UBF announcements, we are now hoping to have network construction and installation take place in 2024.

Parkland County carried out a Starlink Trial that involved four different Starlink units at residential locations known for poor quality and limited access to internet services. A fifth system was activated as a baseline to use in comparison with other units. The trial ran for a 10 to 16-month period to evaluate different weather conditions and is now successfully complete. Based on the trial, we believe low orbit satellite is a viable option for residents and businesses that do not have another connectivity option. We recommend residents that are interested in this option reach out to providers of this service for pricing and availability.

Watch out for Late Blight disease on potatoes and tomatoes!

Late Blight thrives and produces spores in humid, moist environments when extra water is on plants. Be sure to...

- Buy certified seed potatoes/tomatoes.
- Choose a location for your plant where potatoes, tomatoes or green peppers have not been grown for at least four years.
- Plant in a warm, dry, sunny area.
- If you discover Late Blight, destroy the infected plant and those within a two-foot radius.
